

Sustainable Development Fund Guidance Note Places of Worship

Places of worship have a long-term presence at the heart of villages and towns. Important community buildings with green burial ground spaces, they are loved, valued and of significance for believers and non-believers alike. Used for regular worship and religious events, they are a key part of local (and sometimes national) heritage and history. Where communities have no other communal spaces, places of worship can also host wider social events, activities, and services.

Although the Sustainable Development Fund can't support projects that are exclusively religious, applications *may* be considered for projects which:

- a. enable faith buildings to host or deliver wider community benefits or services. This may involve essential conservation or maintenance work to buildings themselves, so that they can be used and enjoyed by the wider community, helping to safeguard heritage assets for the future.
- b. celebrate, conserve, or enhance significant heritage assets and support activities that connect people with heritage.
- c. help to reduce reliance on fossil fuels and improve energy efficiency as part of a wider plan to increase building use.
- d. help to create and conserve habitats for plants and animals in both the buildings themselves and any surrounding burial grounds.

Establishing a church 'Friends Group' may be a useful first step – the Church in Wales has a useful guidance note about this - <u>Forming a Church Friends Group (contentfiles.net)</u>

In addition to meeting general Sustainable Development Fund requirements, proposals need to show:

- That the group and building welcomes anyone and everyone who wants to visit or take part in activities run or services provided. This should be made clear in an equal opportunities policy and any other key governance documents.
- How the faith building is used and the role it currently plays in the community how it links with other local community spaces.
- That plans are in place for future use and development particularly if numbers attending regular worship are reducing.
- That there are partnerships with other local organisations (particularly non-faith groups) to help build capacity and ensure that projects are embedded in the local community, with potential to deliver long-term impacts.

- That where required, permissions such as a <u>Church in Wales Faculty</u>, Planning Consent / Listed Building Consent are in place.
- What difference the funded work would make e.g., attracting new users / groups; improving accessibility; providing essential services locally; improving energy efficiency.
- That match funds / resources are in place or will be secured.
- How funds will be generated to cover essential running and maintenance costs.
- That any materials used are environmentally friendly and locally sourced where possible.
- That local contractors will be used to carry out the work where possible.
